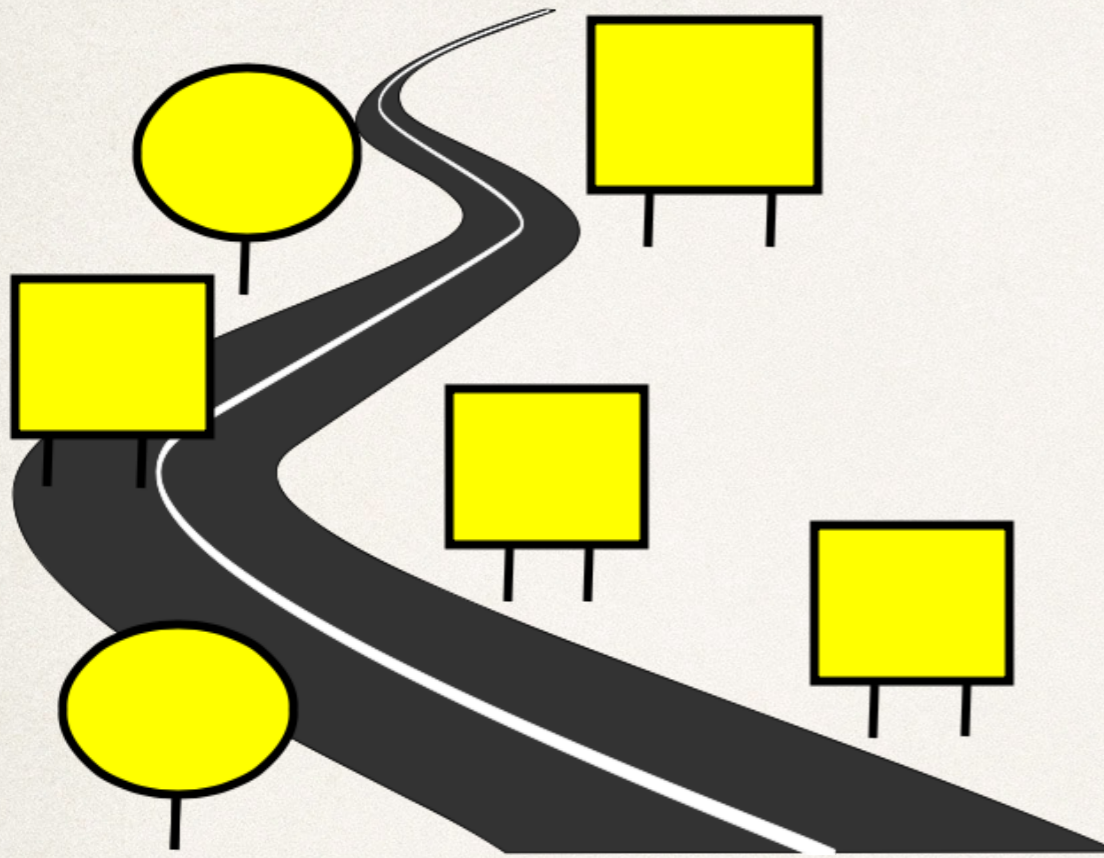

If there were a living, breathing advertisement for why alumni engagement is so impactful, it would come in the form of **Lloyd Segan '80**. Bursting with infectious enthusiasm for the College and a conviction that alumni simply *must* give back, Segan is as part of the fabric of Allegheny now as when he was a student. He is the algorithm for liberal arts education leading to profound career success. Full stop.

Segan is a prominent creative talent and producer whose television series and films have engaged a billion people across the globe. Through his company, Piller/Segan, he works with A-list writers, actors, directors, producers, and others across Hollywood and the media landscape. His connections are the stuff of dreams. And even dreamier, he shares those connections with Allegheny students, understanding that who you know is important. "We have alumni who are titans in their industries, whether it's education, law, medicine, politics, STEM fields, Wall Street — and every one of them would take a call from a student. We have to take advantage of who we know, who we are, and our collective accomplishments," he says.

Performance Ishita Sinha Roy, Ph.D., in her Media and Cultural Studies class since 2006. In addition to embodying the excellence an Allegheny education delivers, he is an inspiration for where a liberal arts degree can take you. He has a knack for breaking down the complexities of news, entertainment, and popular culture, relating it to just about every major there is, making Dr. Sinha Roy's classes a hot ticket.

His reverence for truth and understanding of the media landscape

is reflected in the guest speaker roster he's lined up for Dr. Sinha Roy's class. They are from the highest echelons of his world, most recently including Phil Griffin, the former president and founder of MSNBC who delivered a timely and critical message about the state of journalism; Allison Lee, PEN America's Los Angeles director and former chief development officer for TIME'S UP; and screenwriter Billy Ray ("Captain Phillips," "The Hunger Games," and many more), who talked about getting the facts right in one of his movies, "Richard Jewell," about a real-life person wrongly accused of a major crime.

And because Segan is desirous to emphasize the accomplishments and connections that our alumni can bring to students, he recruited the help of alumni from many different classes, representing their expertise. For example, when he wanted to include a more local perspective on the profound changes happening in professional sports, Segan reached out to **John Meyer '04**, a former reporter and weekend sports anchor. Meyer introduced Segan to **Ted Black '87**, former president of Buffalo Sabres, who joined the class as a guest speaker.

When Segan wanted to recruit expertise about domestic and global cyber security threats, he sought the help of retired general **Jon Davis '80**, who made the

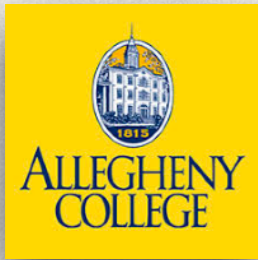

PLACE-BRANDING WITH REGIONAL TOURISM BOARDS



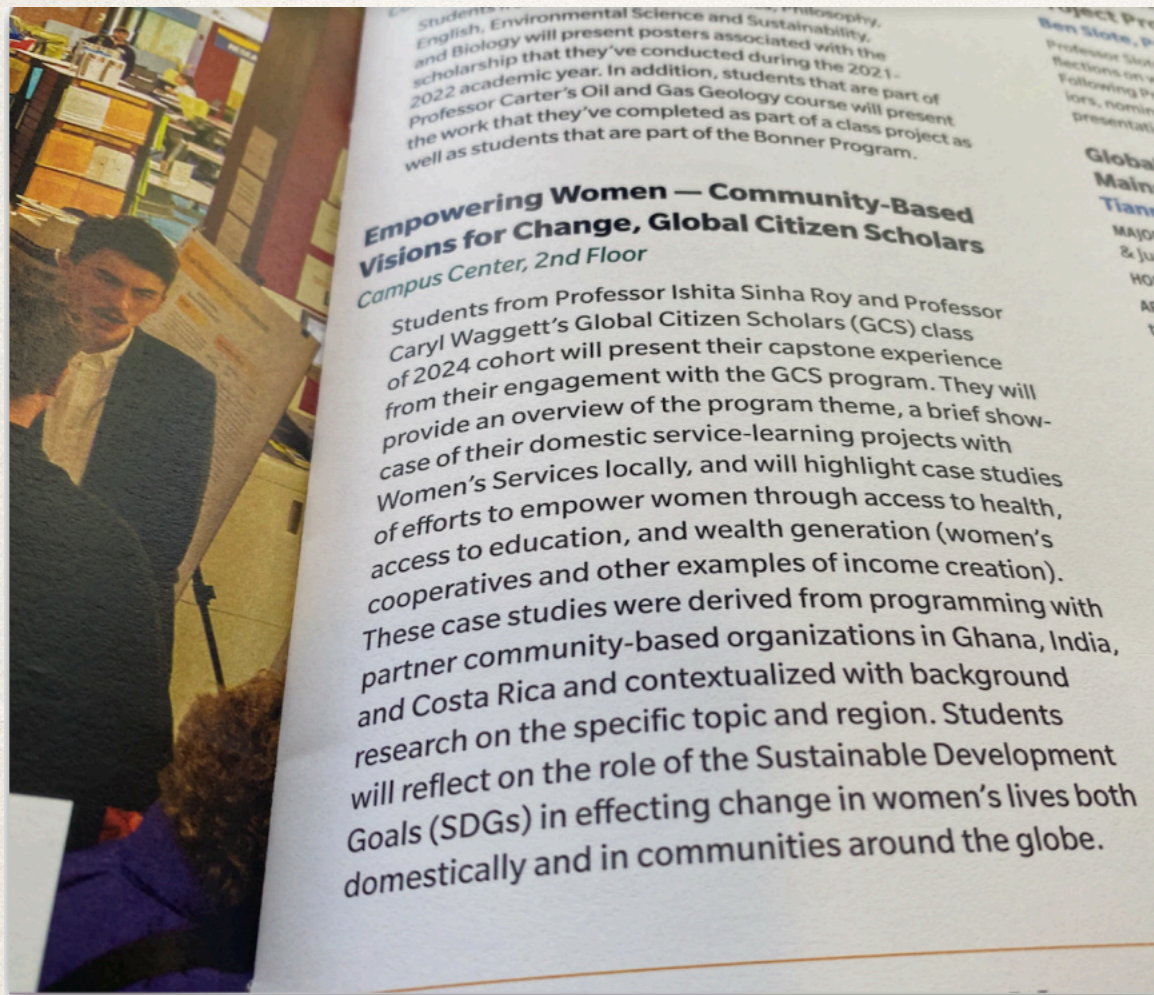

When Alicia Rivera '13 looks back at her academic career at Allegheny, one of the experiences she will value most is her time spent studying overseas. She lived in the town of Triana, Spain, not far from Seville, during the first semester of her junior year.

"It forced me out of my comfort zone and taught me how to adapt to a new setting," says Alicia, a Spanish major. "Study Away gave me the opportunity to immerse myself in a new country, which was an amazing experience, especially in a society heading toward globalization."

The semester in Spain and an experiential learning trip to India will benefit her personally and professionally as she moves into her career, says Alicia. "Adaptation is a key element while abroad or in any new environment. I learned to adapt to my surroundings and have a positive attitude," she says.

"I am more globally aware and culturally sensitive because I learned to observe and experience a new place rather than judge and compare the differences. I learned that a place isn't better or worse than where I come from. It's simply different from what I think is normal. I learned to embrace the Spanish culture rather than criticize it."

Adaptation, creative-thinking and tolerance — these are among the goals of an Allegheny education. The College's administration sees Study Away as an integral part of that process.

As for Alicia, she says she is a more complete and confident person. "An international experience allows students to gain unique perspectives, experiences and ideas that they will bring back, not only to Allegheny but their future careers."





FACULTY-STUDENT COLLABORATION AS STARTING POINT FOR CITIZENSHIP

- ❖ Over summers, I have had the honor of working with several students across various disciplines on collaborative research and experiential learning projects.
- ❖ Whether it is coursework or research outside the classroom, I try and make students see how developing the love of learning for life builds better communities and tomorrows.
- ❖ This is also why teaching assessments, as a pen-and-paper exercise, matter less to me than the feedback I receive from alumni three or four years after they have graduated and have begun to realize the value of a rigorous Allegheny College education.

From Academia to AmeriCorps

What are you doing after graduation? This has become the age-old, sometimes anxiety-producing question for many graduating seniors as they finish up their final semesters of college. But for five Allegheny College students, the answer was easy — post-graduate service through Lake Effect Leaders AmeriCorps VISTA project.

AmeriCorps VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) builds capacity in nonprofit organizations and communities in order to help bring individuals out

of poverty. For over 50 years, AmeriCorps VISTA members have served as a catalyst for change, living and working alongside community members to meet our nation’s most pressing challenges and advance local solutions.

But what led these ambitious students to sign up to serve the Meadville community? As you will see below, for most, it was their experience in academia that led them to pursue a year of anti-poverty work.

“During my time in the communication arts program, I took a number of classes on issues like

globalization, inequality, and neo-liberalism — all of which deepened my need to give back to my community and my interest in helping others by building capacity. Doing research with Professor Ishita Sinha Roy in 2016 about rural politics and the presidential election allowed me to learn more about this region of the United States and was my inspiration for getting to know the Meadville community better. Additionally, the research I conducted for an independent study and my senior thesis was framed around Crawford County’s political, economic, and social history. It is such a blessing to now be working with two nonprofits (CHAPS and the Crawford County Coalition on Housing Needs) whose goals are to assure that every person in Crawford County has housing and the necessary resources to live a fulfilling life.
